MOTIVATING YOUR CHILDREN! PART 6:

- Do not tell a child that a task “will be easy” in order to enhance his/her motivation. (“Come on, Beverly, let’s get started on that map homework. It should be a cinch!”) This well-intentioned strategy often backfires. If the child does well on the task, he/she is not particularly delighted because the assignment was labeled “easy.” Conversely, if he/she has difficulty with the assignment, he/she has failed at a “simple task.” Either way, the child’s pride and self-esteem are not enhanced. A more effective approach is to say, “This task is a challenge, but I know you can do it.”
